




ICAT Day

Behavioral Interviews

Interviewing is perhaps the most critical part of the job application process; it gives you a chance to showcase yourself beyond what a mere letter size paper can convey. Behavioral interviews are based on the idea that past behavior is the greatest indicator of future performance and focus on your experiences. The key to mastering the behavioral interview is to understand which behavioral habit that the question is trying to understand.

Below are some examples of common behavioral interview questions along with the behavioral habit they are focused on.

- Tell me about a time when you had to learn something totally new. [Continuous Learning]

- Tell me about a time when you tried to persuade a person or group to do something they didn't want to do. [Imagination]
- Give me an example of a time when you faced a lot of obstacles to achieving a goal. [Tenacity]
- Tell me about a time when there was a gap between your school training and what you needed to do for work. [Expertise]
- Tell me about a time when you had to balance short and long term priorities. [Clear Thinking]
- Tell me about a time when you had to deal with a person difficult to work with. [Inclusiveness]
- Tell me about a time when you were disappointed with yourself. [Self-Assessment]
- Tell me about a situation when you were responsible for planning and organizing an event. [Project Management]
- Tell me about a project or role that you've taken outside your job description or tell about a role or job you changed substantially while you had it. [Initiative]
