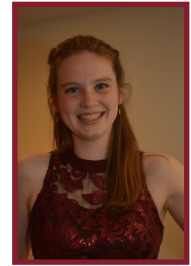

The Student Success Center (SSC)

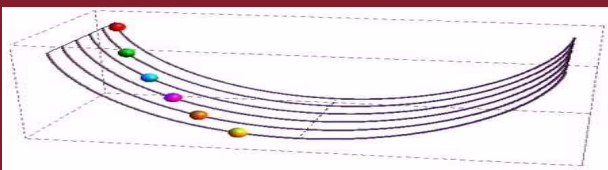

At this point you've probably heard a few things about what classes to take and what grades to get in order to achieve that sweet minimum 3.0. This is very important because getting a minimum of a 3.0 GPA at the end of your freshman year guarantees you the your first choice engineering major; HOWEVER, don't fret if you don't think you'll be able to achieve it. Some majors, especially smaller ones, will still accept you if you don't quite have that GPA, but it is not guaranteed. MechE, ChemE, Aero, and ECE are more competitive majors which you might need to meet the GPA requirement to be accepted into.

As will be discussed at the REQUIRED Galipatia meeting on Tuesday, October 2nd at 7pm, there are certain classes that you must take

before you can declare a degree-granting engineering major. Sometimes, you may not need to take some of these courses if you have AP/IB/ Dual Enrollment credit from previous institutions. These required courses include:

ENGE 1215 & 1216, ENGL 1105 & 1106, CHEM 1035 & 1045, MATH 1225 & 1226, PHYS 2305

If you are currently thinking: “hEIP mE pLeAsE I’m overwhelmed and confused and have no idea what major I want to pick ahhh”

Talk to your advisor! It is very easy to schedule an appointment online or go to drop-in advising hours (found online on the ENGE advising page). Last year when I was having trouble picking a major, deciding what I wanted to do and which classes to take, I scheduled an appointment with my academic advisor. She was very useful in helping me decide which classes to take second semester and which major I should go into based on my interests and skills.

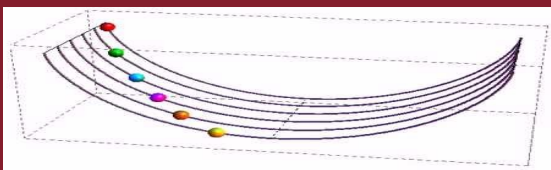
If you are like me, one of the best ways to spend downtime is by browsing Amazon for random items. These next few items can help make your dorm feel just a bit more like home.

1. **String lights** (\$13) – If your bed is lofted, the space underneath the bed gets dark a lot quicker than the rest of the room. String lights is a good way to brighten up your room. They also are a good way to leave lights on when your roommate is still out, but they are not bright enough to prevent you from sleeping.

2. **Wireless speaker** (\$25) – A speaker can bring fun dance party with friends. Music is a great way to brighten up activities that aren't fun. If you want to buy a waterproof speaker, you can shower with music as well. Just make sure that you are observing quiet hours when using your speaker.

3. **Brita filter** (\$20) – If you like bottled water and find the water from the water fountain in Lee undrinkable, a Brita filter is a good option. The smallest Brita filter (5 cup) is small enough to fit into mini fridge. The filter saves you the walk to the water fountain down the hall.
