Torgersen Bridge

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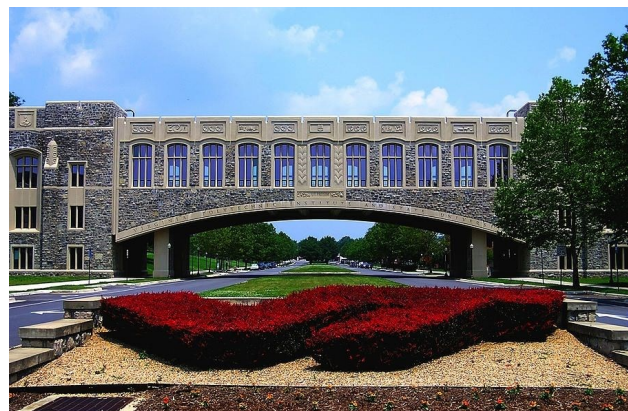
Most people know of Torgersen Bridge as being an iconic structure as well as a prominent entranceway to the Virginia Tech Campus. Students also know of its quiet and comfortable study space, perfect for those in between class study hours. Despite this, many students on campus today are not familiar with the history associated with the bridge.

Construction for Torgersen Hall, the main building connected to the bridge, began back in 1996. From breaking ground to completion, the project took close to 4 years, with the building opening in the year 2000. The building was dedicated to Paul E. Torgersen, the 14th president of Virginia Tech, serving from 1994-2000. Before he was the President of the university, Torgersen served as head of Industrial Engineering from 1967-1970, the Dean of Engineering from 1970-1990, and president of the Corporate Research Center from 1990-1994.

During his time as Dean, Torgersen pushed Virginia Tech Engineering to be nationally recognized. As president, he focused on rebuilding the university's

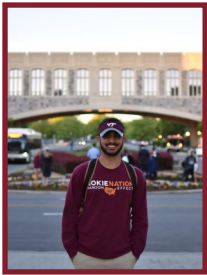
technological leadership. Torgersen Hall was designed to be a building to house technologically-based classrooms (which is why CS majors may notice they have a lot of classes in there), and so it was fitting to name the building after a person who helped with the universities technological ingenuity. Many of you may notice then that Torgersen Bridge goes across Alumni Mall and connects to Newman Library. However, many of you may not know that this was done for a reason.

With Torgersen Hall representing the technological area of the university, and the library representing the academia area, Torgersen bridge serves to show a connection between these two aspects. Virginia Tech is predominantly a university that focuses on STEM related fields. However, that is not the only concentration the university has to offer. The university wanted to show how both the sciences as well as the liberal arts should be taught when a student is receiving an education. Exposing students to both areas, no matter what their major, allows for them to get a more holistic education and become a more well-rounded individual, ensuring its engineering students do not come out after their four years only being exposed to classes related to the sciences.

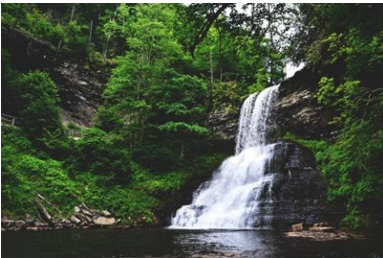
The Great Outdoors

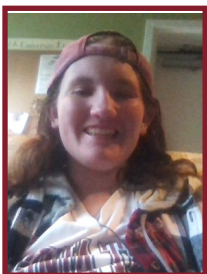
me. This hike is approximately 8 miles long, and has one of the best views I have ever seen!
