KING HENRY VIII'S WIVES

One of the most well-known figures in history is King Henry VIII of England. Strangely enough, he is known primarily for his six marriages and his two daughters, who are even bigger figures in English history. So, who were these women that he married?

Catherine of Aragon was Henry's first wife. She was the daughter of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain and the widow of Henry's older brother, Arthur. Catherine Parr was Henry's sixth wife and ultimately survived him. She published multiple books and supported female artists, having one paint her portrait, during her life.
